

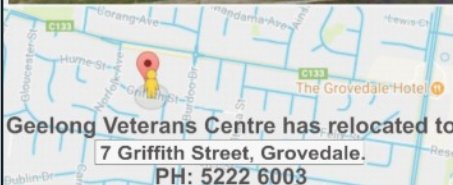
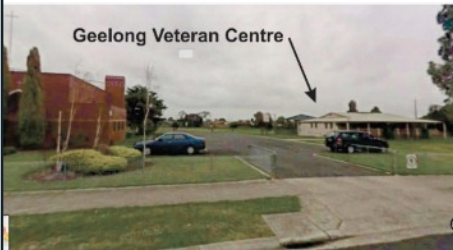


Ocean Grove Barwon Heads RSL Sub-branch

News You May Have Missed

Latest News from The Victorian

Government: *The free public transport travel arrangement which has applied to ANZAC Day has now been extended to include Vietnam Veterans Day and Remembrance Day. This includes Veterans, war widows, school students, ADF cadets, Scouts and Girl Guides, and serving ADF personnel. Veterans will also receive free travel on public transport during Veterans Health Week. This applies Victoria wide. To receive the free travel, you must be wearing your medals, or be in uniform, or produce a membership or valid I.D. card.*

Scouts Overseas Servicemen Christmas Parcels

The Ocean Grove Scouts are again intending to repeat their efforts of last year, and distribute Christmas boxes to ADF members serving overseas. The sub-branch will again fund the items to send and the scouts will pack each parcel.

Probus Club Presentation

On Monday 28th May OGBH RSL Sub-Branch Treasurer Tony Wheel delivered a presentation to the Point Lonsdale Combined Probus Club in their meeting venue at the Point Lonsdale Golf Club. The



presentation is part of his work as the Sub-Branch Community Support Volunteer and in this capacity he

provides presentations to schools, Lions, Rotary and Probus Clubs and other interested organisations. While he has delivered presentations on a wide range of historical military topics, in this case the subject was RAAF 9 Squadron Operations in Vietnam where he served as a helicopter pilot during 1969-70.

Research Project.

The research project is ongoing with WW1 list of names now completed. However, WW2 is a bit more difficult. Most of the military records are closed and so we are relying on the National Archive, WW2 nominal roll and the new version of the DVA nominal roll to narrow down our list of names, we have also added the names from the various Honour Boards in Ocean Grove, Barwon Heads & Connewarre. Also to make it a little more challenging we find that the Navy did not record the Location on Enlistment of their recruits and so we need to research a little deeper to find the individuals. Most Honour Boards show the married name of women that served, but in fact they may have enlisted under their maiden names and married later also increasing the research effort.

Air Activities Night

On Wednesday 22nd August saw our hard working Treasurer / Presentations man Tony Wheal speaking at OG Scout meeting about flying air craft and what flaps, rudders and ailerons do to keep you in the air.

The presentation included an activity, where each Scout made a paper dart glider. Once this task was complete each Scout "test flew" their glider to make sure it performed satisfactorily and adjustments were made where necessary.

A discussion on the various controls followed after which each control was simulated by lightly folding that part of the glider approximating the controls of an actual aircraft. Once a particular control had been simulated, the results of the test were predicted. After each test flight the controls were returned to the neutral position.



After that activity, the session was opened for questions most of which concerned the effects of weather on an aircraft's performance and the problems associated with flying in bad weather.

The presentation concluded with the Scouts watching U-Tube video clips on how a rubber band powered aircraft, capable of remaining airborne for 30 seconds or more, might be made.

Geelong a target in WWII? Noel Murphy reports on a . . .

Secret Tojo push

THE darkest days faced by Australia in World War II were in 1942.

But who in their wildest reckonings might have considered the Japanese brazen enough to fly over Geelong?

Yet that's when the Japanese flew a remarkable reconnaissance mission across the Bellarine Peninsula — from Point Lonsdale to Portarlington where they looked out for Geelong itself — up the western rim of Port Phillip Bay to Laverton, Altona and Melbourne before circling back out to Bass Strait and a waiting submarine off King Island.

The day was February 26 and Warrant Flying Officer Nobuo Fujita had been bunkered down in the submarine since flying his "Glen" float plane over Sydney Harbour nine days earlier when he emerged to scout across Melbourne.

Author David Jenkins records the flight in detail in his 1992 book *Battle Surface — Japan's Submarine War against Australia 1942-44*.

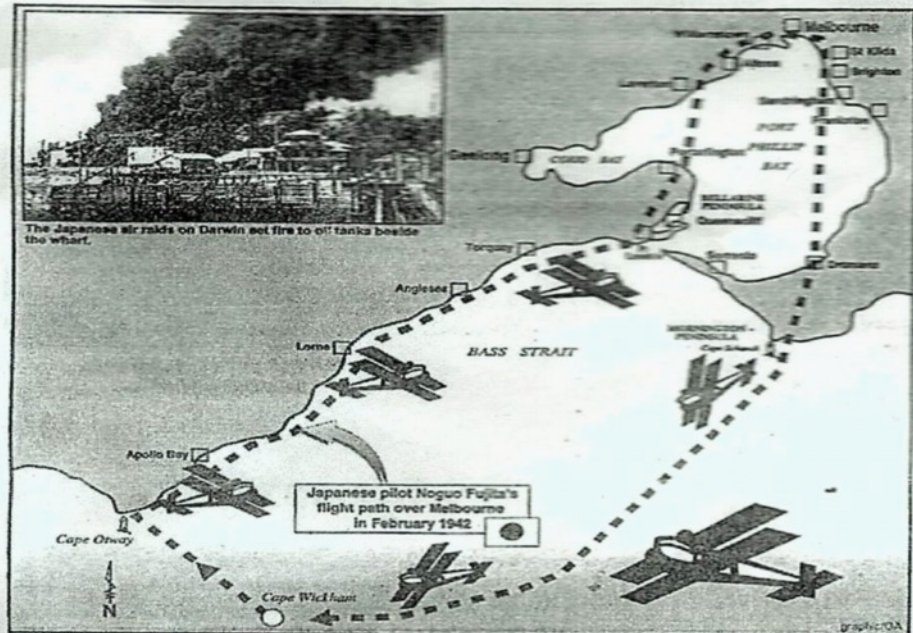
According to Jenkins, Fujita and another airman Shoji Okuda, were in the air two hours before dawn, flying north across Bass Strait toward Cape Otway.

"Here, he would bank to the northeast and follow the coast to Point Lonsdale lighthouse, a beacon which had stood for 80 years at the narrow entrance to Port Phillip Bay," he writes.

"Fujita crossed the coast to the west of the lighthouse, where concrete gun emplacements had recently been built among the tea-tree and sand dunes.

"There was little danger of detection. The heavy cloud hid his plane from view. The sound of his engine was drowned out by the booming of the surf.

"Fujita flew across the Bellarine Peninsula towards Portarlington,



everything still hidden by cloud. Off to the left lay Lake Connewarre . . . sixteen kilometres beyond the lake was Geelong, Victoria's second largest city.

"Still flying northeast, Fujita passed over Portarlington and began a 24-kilometre run across the western reaches of the bay. Light was beginning to seep into the eastern sky. But there was no let-up in the cloud cover and he could not be sure where he was.

"The cloud seems very thick", said Okuda.

"If you find a gap," said Fujita, "let me know".

"We must be over Port Phillip Bay.

"If there is a break in the cloud we should be able to see Geelong."

Fujita decided to descend through the clouds. What he saw, however, was not Geelong. Fujita and Okuda, was in fact directly on top of the former RAAF base at Laverton, where a dozen Wirraway fighters as

well as Hudson bombers and Avro Ansons were based.

"It was a terrible place to come down," Fujita recounts in Jenkins' book.

The twin-float single-engine Japanese plane was spotted by no less than nine RAAF personnel.

Two searches were mounted and three Wirraways ordered to Bairnsdale as a striking force to try to find the Japanese intruder — unsuccessfully as it turned out — as a now very nervous Fujita hightailed it back to the sanctuary of the clouds.

He dropped out of the cloud every so often to make observations. He flew unscathed but not unnoticed over Altona and Williamstown.

At the Williamstown rifle range — where four heavy anti-aircraft guns were in place — gun layer Aubrey Auton was on duty carrying out a routine inspection of the equipment. He recounts in Jenkins'

book how he watched Fujita in a leather flying suit and helmet as he leaned out of an open cockpit. He swears the pilot grinned down at them.

Fujita continued over to Melbourne before turning south for St Kilda, Brighton, Sandringham and Frankston.

Okuda spied 19 ships at anchor in the harbour plus five destroyers moving Indian file towards Port Melbourne led by a light cruiser.

He crossed the shore at Dromana, flying on to Cape Schank and on to Cape Wickham where he met his submarine without further incident.

Military authorities kept the Japanese flight quiet, for obvious reasons, but Okuda continued his spying, moving next to Hobart, then Wellington and Auckland in New Zealand and finally on to Suva and American Samoa.

Vietnam Veterans' Day.

Vietnam Veterans Day service was held on Saturday 18th August with only about 20 people in attendance. It was disappointing only a few bothered and the sub-branch will be reviewing as to the continuation next year. It is a lot of effort on the part of the committee to have such a small turnout of people.



CAN YOU HELP ?

The Ocean Grove Barwon Heads RSL Sub-branch has commenced a research program to provide an accurate data base of veterans of WW1, WW2, Korea, Malaysia-Borneo, Vietnam and other conflicts involving Australian Troops. It is to involve those veterans born and/ or gave the location of residence on their enlistment as, Ocean Grove, Barwon Heads or Connewarre and those who returned and resided in those districts at the end of their service for a minimum of 2 years. At the completion of the research, the veterans' names will be placed on Honour Rolls on the Memorials entrusted to the upkeep of the Sub-branch.

The Sub-branch would welcome the assistance of relatives, family members and friends of veterans. We seek details of Full Names, DOB, place of enlistment (if known), regimental numbers and final resting place (again, if known).
